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



## HEALTH + WELLNESS COMMITTEE Stretches for health

## PRE-DENTAL COMMITTEE Guiding the Pre-Dents

As dental students and future dental professionals, we are at risk of neck and back pain if we are not mindful of our posture and ergonomics. Stretching throughout the day can help alleviate this discomfort if done habitually. The following stretches should be held for three deep breaths and repeated on each side as needed.

Start with a gentle neck stretch by pulling your ear towards your shoulder. You can stop here or add a bit of rotation by directing your gaze upwards.

Next, a wrist stretch by raising your arm with your elbow and wrist extended and fingers spread wide. Using your other hand, bend at your wrist to pull your hand back toward yourself. You should feel a stretch under your wrist.

Then, a spinal twist by sitting tall and cross-legged on the floor with a gentle twist to one side, then the other. You can place your hands on your knees to help stabilize.

Next, Child's pose by lying face down with your arms extended out in front of you, palms down, and knees tucked under you with your toes together and knees apart. You should feel a stretch from your shoulders through your lower back.

Lastly, a chest opener stretch which can be done while sitting in a chair. Place both hands behind your head, inhale, and take both elbows backwards. You should feel a stretch in the front of your shoulders and chest.

These are just a few stretches to begin. There are many other beneficial stretches as well as strengthening exercises that can help keep your body healthy and comfortable while performing dental procedures.

Working with pre-dental students is very rewarding and exciting. We were all in their shoes and understand the road they are on. It is a stressful and long journey that hopefully pays off in the end. The Pre-Dental Committee tries to find ways to help out these students by providing guidance, offering advice, and hosting events for them to become acquainted with schools and the profession. So far this year, we have revived our Pre-Dental Partner Program in which a student is paired with a mentor who is a student in the dental school. They provide guidance and mentorship in any way the pre-dental student needs. In addition, they send monthly emails to their partner filled with info for students in every stage of the application and undergraduate process. ## Harness your Public Image

Social media has a huge impact on dentistry and how you represent your company nowadays, especially when there are so many exceptional dentists for community members to choose from. Platforms like Instagram, Facebook and Twitter are viewed daily by community members, assuring that your information and content is seen. This is a great way to start building trust and confidence for your patients before they walk in the door. By posting previous treatment photos (ie. Before and after clinical photos WITH patient consent) and patient testimonials, viewers can see your quality work and be able to confidently make a decision. Additionally, you can also post photos of your office and new technologies, as this might be another attractive source to lure viewers into their first comprehensive exam with you. To make your page more personable, try adding more than just clinical photos. Another tip would be to engage with the viewers- show that you care. A way of doing this would be holding contests, interactive instagram stories and responding in a timely manner to all inquiries. I am the Associate Professor of Endodontics, I work with the students in the capacity of the Director of the Predoctoral Endodontics. I am the course director of the introduction to endodontics course which involves the preclinical training part that exposes the students to the art and science of endodontics. The second course is related to clinical endodontics procedures which deals with clinical tips and tricks to polish the students' skills to provide the highest quality of patient care in the clinics. I also teach the endodontic part in multiple other courses. I also teach and supervise the grad endo residents.

The biggest lesson I learned from working with students is to believe in them, that education is not a one size-fits-all experience. All students have different needs and abilities; they learn in their own way and in their own space. My goal is to identify these differences from the start and determine different learning styles of my students and develop different teaching strategies to fit their needs and skill levels.



## **ENDODONTIST**

I recognize that my students bring unique strengths to the classroom, and I see my role as designing a pathway for each of them to succeed. I strive to create the most fitting path for my students to ensure their success in dental school and beyond.

I do believe that all students are created equally but differently. Every student wants to succeed, so failure is not an option. It is my total responsibility to guide, instruct and monitor their paths to the right way during their journey to achieve their goals. Not only developing the best teaching modality is important, but also developing innovative methods for assessments. Assessment is an essential component of the teaching and learning cycle. During and after each course, I ask myself three questions: How many students met the learning outcomes? Should I provide an additional explanation or opportunity? Effective assessment of learning enables the educator to monitor student learning throughout the course and gives the ability to make necessary adjustments to improve learning.

One thing that has never ceased to amaze me is that the most unexpected and rewarding change can occur in the most unexpected way as a result of the most unexpected series of events. Late in 1996, I found out, quite by accident, the building I leased and where I practiced dentistry for nineteen years was scheduled to be demolished. The end result of the next eleven tumultuous and stressful months was my own new building having multiple tenants including new space for my continued dental practice. In 2008 I began part-time at the dental school resulting from my daughter's request, then a new undergrad freshman starting a summer Organic Chemistry course. Her reasoning: I could "Take her to Lunch" on Fridays. In 2016 one of my sons left a position at a company where it became clear he would not be promoted despite his wealth of personal knowledge and MBA background. Traits his employer simply did not value; ignoring the multiple positive contributions he had made toward the company's success. As a result, I had the opportunity to interact with him pursuing his passion for automotive innovation learning more about him and his unique qualities as a person.

### **GROUP LEADER**

In May 2010, I became a Group Leader in Clinic C, replacing Dr. Richard Hagner. As a Part-time Faculty for two years prior to that, I had become comfortable working with students giving them practical clinical direction for patient care. As a Group Leader my role expanded to being responsible for tracking the clinical progress for my ten students from each class and many of their peers; all completing their formal progress towards their professional careers. One of the biggest challenges I face is having students appreciate the Global Picture in treatment planning and patient care. Most students are so intensely focused on performing specific treatment they often minimize the need to pre-plan the patient's situation on a comprehensive scale. Students are often so focused on performing the awesome procedures we "can" do in dentistry; they lose track of the planning required to answer whether we "should" provide a given treatment for a particular patient. The most important experience I've had as a Group Leader working with students is; no matter the student's background at the start of their dental education, virtually all navigate this educational journey successfully. They just progress at different rates but each one achieves a solid clinical background driven by self awareness and self-evaluation.
